The digital shift is part of a five-year contract worth \$17 million between Pearson and the NYC Department of Education, aimed at reflecting the growing presence of technology in daily life. While some parents worry about how the new format might affect student performance, others see it as an opportunity to improve the testing experience. However, it's essential for students to note that digital exams can be challenging, even with proper preparation. In March 2025, official practice tests will become available, providing a more authentic experience. The test duration remains three hours long, but accommodations made under IEP or 504 plans will still be honored. Students' devices, such as iPads, Chromebooks, or others, will need to have the necessary testing app installed and checked before the exam. The SHSAT remains accessible to students with disabilities despite the digital shift, with accommodations available for those who need them. Students can opt for a paper-and-pencil version if that works better for them, ensuring they can access the test in a way that supports their needs. In 2026, the test will become computer-adaptive, with questions adjusting in difficulty based on student performance. The SHSAT is an annual examination administered to eighth- and ninth-grade students in NYC, determining admission to most of the city's specialized high schools. The results are released to schools in March, allowing students must meet a sliding scale: a raw score of 60 or higher for a GPA of 3.50 or higher; 65 or higher for a GPA lower than 3.50 but at least 3.25; or 70 or higher for a GPA lower than 3.25 but at least 3.0. You'll need a score of at least 30 to move forward. You have 180 minutes to finish everything, but you can divide that time however you like between English Language Arts and Mathematics. If you start with one section, you can switch to the other whenever you're ready. Just make sure to read each part's instructions carefully. Each question only has one right answer, so pick the best choice for each one. When you finish a question, move on to the next until you've done them all or run out of time. Your score is based on how many questions you get right. Even if you're unsure, try to answer every question. Don't spend too much time on a hard question - if you have to stay for the whole test session (180 minutes). Students have 180 minutes to complete the test, add up the correct answers for each section. Keep in mind that the SHSAT is graded on a curve, making it difficult to predict scores.
