The CJBAT test is a mandatory exam for Floridians pursuing careers in law enforcement or corrections. This multiple-choice test consists of 97 questions and must be completed within 1.5 hours. It's divided into three sections that evaluate various competencies, including Behavioral Attributes, Memorization, and Written Comprehension and Reasoning. Behavioral Attributes assess personal characteristics and attributes, taking up 20 minutes with 47 questions. This section evaluates one's moral character to ensure they can perform law enforcement duties. Sample questions include scenarios where a candidate must decide how to handle lost items or make sound judgments in high-pressure situations. Memorization is another key component, testing an individual's ability to recall and process information quickly and accurately. This portion consists of 10 pictures, each with a 1.5-minute time limit, requiring candidates to memorize the details. The Written Comprehension and Reasoning section combines deductive reasoning, written expression skills. With a time limit of one hour and 40 questions, this segment evaluates cognitive abilities, understanding of written material, grammar, and language skills.
