Application fees vary, but some platforms charge a non-refundable fee. Document requirements include a bachelor's degree certificate, high school certificate, proof of language proficiency (English or German), and translations of documents not in English or German. A cover letter, passport copy, and any additional required documents are also necessary. Standard application deadlines for German Master's programs are July 15th for winter semesters and January 15th for summer semesters. However, some universities have earlier deadlines, especially for non-EU/EEA students. Researching your options early is crucial to avoid limited choices. Make sure to keep receipts, as filing your first tax return could result in a substantial refund. Before heading to Germany, check if you need a student visa. EU, EEA, or Swiss citizens don't require one, while students from select countries can travel without a visa and apply for a residence permit upon arrival. Non-EU students must apply for a visa before their trip, which may involve an embassy appointment. To secure a spot, be prepared to provide proof of sufficient funds, typically demonstrated by having a set amount in a blocked bank account. Once the process is complete, find accommodation in Germany - it can be challenging, especially for international students. Your university or the DSW (German student union) and DAAD may offer helpful advice. Arriving in Germany, register with the authorities ("Wohnsitz anmelden") and apply for a student residence permit if necessary. Masters programs typically last 18-24 months and are tuition-free at public universities, although some exceptions apply. Private universities charge between €7,000 to €15,000 per year.
