As Natalie prepares for an egg drop contest with two other kids, she looks at her mothers situation with the same scientific process. Her ultimate plan is to win the contest and then use the prize money to whisk her mother away on a special trip. Its a beautiful, well-done story and a compassionate look at depression. The Girl Who Drank the Moon by Kelly BarnhillFANTASYWonderfullycrafted and imagined, this 2017 Newbery award winner isa fairy tale of sorts about a good witch who rescues one of the towns many abandoned (sacrificed) babies instead of giving her to another town to adopt and love. Shes a special baby named Luna who accidentally becomes infused with moon magic. Its also the story of the babys magical, bereaved mother, a wicked witch who feedsoff sorrow, a woodcaver who wants justice, and most of all, an amazing girl named Luna. Pretty by Justin SayreREALISTIC/ COMING OF AGEBeautifully written and plotted, Justin Sayre has created a coming-of-age masterpiece not to be missed. Sophies life is complicated. Hiding her moms alcohol addiction affects everything, even her schoolwork. When her mother leaves for a trip, her aunt moves in and gently helps Sophie learn about being a strong, beautiful, biracial woman. Sophie blossoms with the love and kindness of her aunt. PrimeHISTORICAL MYSTERYAn excellent, page-turning mystery set in 1880s Sweden about an orphan girl named Mika whose survival skills include an eye for detail, connections, and deductions! After an abandoned baby is dropped into her arms in the middle of the night, a police detective recruits her to assist him in identifying a dead body and then investigating a prison cell all in pursuit of a copycat serial killer. But Mika realizes its not a copycat. In a dangerous game of cat and mouse, she and the detective need to avoid the corrupt prison officials and the serial killer. This observant heroine is my favorite kind resourceful, aspirational, and interesting. I cant wait for more books in the series. (Sensitive readers: Includes the word crp.) Words on Fire by Jennifer A. NielsenHISTORICAL FICTIONLearn the history of Lithuanias book smugglers as well as the fundamental truth that books give readers freedom from oppression; books keep alive a language, culture, and identity, no matter how hard someone tries to erase it. Audra doesnt know her parents are book smugglers until they are arrested by the Cossacks. She flees to their contacts house but she herself cant read or write. She slowly learns and develops a passion for stories. Not only that, she became a clever smuggler. Above World by Jenn ReeseSCI-FIHumans are created to live in tech-dependent, animal-morphed groups with different climates and groups: mer people, snake people, centaur, bird people and the groups have mostly remained separate from each other. The main character, Aluna, a Kampil (mer), has left her clan in order to discover why the clan is dying. In Mirage, she and her unique group of friends must try to convince the Equian colonies that the evil Karl Strand is trying to take over Above World. Harbor Me by Jacqueline WoodsonREALISTICHarbor Metackles some very big issues including race, immigration, bullying, learning differences, friendship, and forgiveness. The story is about six diverse children with learning differences. They bond during a special kids-only time on Friday afternoons where they share their stories, many of which Haley records on a tape recorder. Even as she learns about the other kids who are, Haley is reluctant to share that her own dad is in jail for the car accident killing her mother. Circus Mirandusby Cassie BeasleyMAGICAL REALISMYoull fall in love with this magical story about a lonely boy whose beloved grandfather faces a life-ending illness. Micahs grandfather and Micahhope the Lightbender in the Circus Mirandus who owes the grandfather a miracle, will be able to help. With a missive to the Lightbender, Micah soon discovers the magical circus her grandfather once loved so much. Its an adventure filled with emotion and faith. The Outcasts: Brotherband Chronicles, Book 1 by John FlanaganADVENTUREA well-written story of a young, fearless boy named Hal whose mom was an Araluen slave. To survive the towns prejudice against him, he ishelped by another outcast, his dead fathers former shipmate, a one-armed recovering drunk. When its time for his Brotherband training, he becomes the leader of a rag-tag group of boys. Theyll compete against better, stronger teams who dont always play fair. The stakes are high and Hal must win even with his group of misfits. Captain Superlative by J. S. PullerREALISTICRight from the start, we know Captain Superlative is gone. This foreshadowing kept me reading with curiosity. The big lesson our main character, Janey, learns is about not standing by when injustice is happening. She learns this from a girl dressed in a swimsuit, wig, mask, and high tops who arrives at her middle school and changes everything. Read this with a book club or with a friend! When his enclave is attacked by Noahs soldiers looking for her, Sky realizes that everything she believed about Noah is wrong. Through her parents, Anjali begins to see her world differently including the poverty-stricken caste of many people call the Untouchables. Other Indian families do not like the changes her family is making. Then, Anjalis mom is thrown in jail! The Loop by Ben OliverDYSTOPIANThe world is one government under the control of an AI called Hapay. Great writing plus an unexpected plot make this hard to put down! Goodbye Strangerby Rebecca SteadREALISTICThis is middle school at its most intimate and revealing where friends experience the challenges of growing up, from an embarrassing sexting photo mistake to a shameful friend betrayal, and where we see the power of forgiveness and love. Would this make your best books for 7th grader lists? Greetings From Witness Protection by Jake BurtADVENTURE/ REALISTICA winsome story of adventure and finding where you belong. Nick leaves the group home to live with a family in the witness protection program. She likes her newest foster family and takes her role seriously. Ileana is an ordinary girl who finds joy and solace in stories, especially the folktales her father tells her and the ones she writes and rewrites in her journal. Still, Im happy that there are many upper middle grade books that are cool enough for them like those on this list. Seventh graders are on the brink of teenage life and may relate most strongly to books about body image, crushes, and similar topics. Theyre also more able to tolerate tastefully done stories about sexual harassment, domestic violence, addiction, serious mental illness, and other harsh, unpleasant realities of life. On this list, youll find middle grade and teen books that hit all of these themes. Of course, as always mentioned, seventh graders can always read up or down. Here are some of my favorite books for 7th graders: Mysteries Coming-of-Age Stories 13-year-old Kass is new to a Catholic private school where shes on the dive team. Shes left behind her best friend Aleah, with whom shes struggling to stay in touch, and feels a bit lost in the social circles of her new school, where dive queen Amber reigns supreme. Then Kass meets Miles. Miles is a teen dropout whom Kass encounters dumpster diving outside her school. The two begin a tentative friendship as Miles shares his philosophy about dumpster diving while giving her peek into the turmoil of his life, his veteran dad, who has PTSD and memory issues, their financial dire straits. As Kasss eyes are opened to the world in a different way, her own life begins to undergo small shifts, until one event changes her and Miles relationship forever. I read this is one huge gulp. Its so poignant and filled with longing. This book will get tweens thinking and talking about right and wrong, family, friendship, sports, ambition, social classes, and the consequences of their actions. I adored it and think it is the perfect upper middle grade book for fans of Morrisons Up for Air and Choldenoks The Tenth Mistake of Hank Hooperman. Ages 11+ Sci-Fi/Dystopia Romance Action/Adventure/Survival Jo (aka Josephine, named after Jo March) is still reeling from her parents divorce and her fathers decision to leave them for his girlfriend and her family. To prove that she and her mom can handle life without him, Jo and her mom embark on a 100+ mile hike along Lake Superior to the Lutsen Gondola, carrying their backpacks, dehydrated food, tents, and a book (for Jo). As the two weather hilly terrain, minor injuries, wild animals, new friendships, disappointments, and adverse weather, they learn to find their inner strength to move on and to forgive Tim. Jos father, Just Keep Walkings a triumphant celebration of adventure, perseverance, and the healing power of the outdoors. Ages 9+ Historical Fiction Elsbeth Cupepper is a house servant in 1776 Boston when the Patriots start to gain an advantage over the British. Her boss is a British loyalist and flees to Britain, leaving her in his home, even as her own father goes missing. Soon, the Pike family, their rambunctious children, a teen girl in their care, and their mean-spirited housekeeper move into the house. As the Revolutionary War continues, a smallpox epidemic begins to rage, throwing Elsbeths life into disarray. This is a very slice-of-life story buoyed by a strong protagonist, a thread of mystery, the hijinks of a large family, and the historical background. I loved that this book is set in the 1700s because theres a real gap in the market, and I became increasingly invested in Elsbeth as the story progressed. Still, this book is more coming-of-age in the time of smallpox than it is a Revolutionary War story, and it is over 400 pages, so it is probably best for stronger upper middle school readers with a special fondness for historical fiction.Ages 10+ Verse Novels This is an incredible (mostly) verse novel about a boy who vandalizes a gravestone of a 46r Adornada woman and is tasked with hiking all 46 peaks as reparations. I read this one from start to finish in a single day, and I loved the multiple formats written in posters, pictures, text messages, letters, recipes, and, yes, verse. Finn is angry a lot, and the hike introduces him to people who knew his dad and a slobbering dog, Seymour. This one combines adventure, heart, mystery, suspense, and flashbacks in a beautifully crafted narrative. Its just really clever, has a strong kid appeal, and is full of emotional depth.Ages 10+ Graphic Novel A First Time for EverythingDan Santats new graphic memoir about his school trip to Europe at the end of middle school. Middle school Dan is shy and socially awkward. He spends most of his time helping his mom, who has Lupus, and gets teased a bit by some girls in his grade. Thankfully, his parents are determined that he see the world, and they support his European trip. As they visit Germany, France, Switzerland, and England, Dan is swept up in many, many firsts, making for a life-changing trip. A First Time for Everythinga stellar, relatable graphic novel about growing up, wading through the awkward tween years, and finding ones voice. Ages 10+ Sports Stories When Rory moves to Cincinnati, Ohio, with her dad after her parents separation, she meets Abby, a tall fellow basketball lover, and the two become fast friends. Imagine their shock when they find out that their dads cant stand each other and not because they coach the citys rival basketball teams but because of something that happened years ago when THEY were middle schoolers. Bishop gets warning. So the student may choose to conduct research on global warming and present that information in book report form. Alternatively, students may want to conduct research on an author, a setting presented in a book, an animal, a historical era, etc. Nonfiction books are filled with so many interesting ideas, so the possibilities are numerous as to what students may research. Provide a research template for students to record their information. Students will promote their books by drafting a 15 to 60-second radio commercial. It is very helpful (maybe even necessary) to do this activity as a whole class assignment first so that students observe the proper way to create a radio commercial. A few guidelines to consider Direct the message to a specific audience when writing the radio commercial. What do you want the audience to do as a result of hearing the commercial? This is called a call to action.
